You can tell a lot about a community from the way it takes care of its vulnerable populations, including the elderly, the needy and the sick. Two excellent examples of the stuff of which Grove City is made are the Grove City Area United Way and the Grove City Relay For Life.



Grove City Area United Way

Years ago, charitable agencies and organizations turned to their local Community Chests for funding to support the good work they did to help their friends and neighbors in

times of need. As these community-based
foundations evolved into United Way
organizations, Grove City followed suit.

Since 2005, Grove City Area United Way has awarded over \$1.9 million in grants to local programs, and executive director Amy Foley said, "It's important to remember that all of those dollars stay here in Grove City."

Foley works with a 14 to 17 member volunteer board of directors each year who are charged with being "good stewards of donors' funds," through the rigorous process of reviewing grant requests from local agencies. The board of directors then awards the funds based on their potential to impact the community in five focus areas:

- Crisis intervention
- Helping children and youth succeed
- Strengthening families and promoting self-sufficiency
- Supporting vulnerable populations
- Community enrichment: education and development for youth and vulnerable populations

The board gives priority to those agencies that provide for the crucial basic needs of food, housing

and utilities when allocating campaign funds, followed by those that enrich the community.

Foley calls her job extremely rewarding, yet at times, disheartening. "Sometimes I wonder if we're doing enough," she said. "Grove City is one of those communities that seems ideal in every way, but if you look just below the surface, you'll find a great deal of need."

Nearly one-third of Grove City School District's students qualify for a free or reduced lunch. The Grove City Community Food Pantry feeds 1,200 hungry people every month. Foley receives two to three calls weekly from people who don't know where to turn for help in the face of utility shut-off or eviction. "So many people are struggling just to get by," she said. "They are just one health crisis, accident or missed paycheck away from being penniless and homeless," she said.

Foley is pleased that rather than simply directing money at a problem, Grove City Area United Way supports programs that help people help themselves in order to break the cycle of poverty, including counseling and financial management and literacy classes.

On the brighter side, Foley said that events like Stuff the Bus, which provides needy children with school supplies and Day of Caring, that has hundreds of volunteers turning out on a Saturday morning to get their hands dirty to improve their community make it all worthwhile. "There's nothing as heartwarming as seeing the smile of a child who's never had a new backpack for school get one for the very first time."

Grove City Relay For Life

Until 2016, Grove City citizens who wished to participate in the American Cancer Society's Relay for Life lent their support to the Mercer event. But, community manager Amy Lynn Clark saw an opportunity and a need to provide Grove City with a Relay of their own. "There was a passion in the community to have one in their

own backyard," said Clark, who has been involved with the American Cancer Society since she helped her grandmother with a swim-a-thon at just seven years old.

So, after "lots of conversations," the decision came down from American Cancer Society's regional offices to pilot a Relay in Grove City. The caveat was that they had an extremely tight timeline to make it happen—six months.



Clark's search for just the right person to coordinate the event turned up Lori Boshaw, who'd chaired a Relay in her former hometown in Oregon. "She is everything a chairperson should be," said Clark. "Tireless, dedicated and smart. She eats, breathes and sleeps Relay."

The first stop for Clark and Boshaw was the Grove City Area Chamber of Commerce to meet with Executive Director Beth Black for help with identifying key leaders in the community who would support their efforts. "Beth's help was invaluable," said Clark. "She knows the shakers and the movers, and gave us great insight on how to bring them on board."

As the July event date drew ever nearer, Boshaw and Clark and their team found themselves working around the clock to make sure all the details would be in place for their inaugural event. "There are a lot of moving parts to coordinate," said Clark. "People would be amazed."

When the big day arrived, it came with a sketchy weather forecast, but as with most large-scale affairs, Relay is a rain or shine event. The rain that drizzled off and on during the day

matured into a torrential downpour at 3 o'clock, just as the opening ceremony was about to begin. Survivors took their victory lap around the track during a brief respite from the showers, and several other activities throughout the evening, including the emotional lighting of the luminaria went on despite Mother Nature's lack of cooperation.

But, early the following morning, Boshaw and Clark cried uncle and cancelled the event. "In all my years of involvement with Relay, I've never had to do that," said Boshaw. "But, you can only change your socks so many times."

In spite of the challenges, Grove City's first Relay for Life was an "incredible success" said Clark. "For a first year event, I was shocked with the results." Eleven teams helped raise \$40,000, including \$3,500 from its flagship sponsor, Grove City Medical Center. "The support of this community far exceeded our expectations," said Clark.

Although the fundraising aspect of Relay For Life is critical to supporting education, research, patient advocacy and services, it's about much more than the money. "Each participant takes something special away with them from Relay," said Clark.

For years, Clark had seen a diehard cancer survivor at area Relays, walking the survivors' lap hand in hand with his wife. "When he learned about the Grove City Relay, he was so excited to walk it in his own hometown, and when I saw him rounding the track, I said to myself, 'That's what it's all about."

Grove City College Interns





As well as getting the valuable, out-of-the-classroom experience they were supposed to get out of their internships, Grove City College students Annabelle Rutledge '17 and Hannah Vaccaro '18 can also say they changed thousands of lives for the better.

The women spent the summer of 2016 working as interns on fundraising for the Wexford, Pa.,-based Christian and East African Equatorial Development (CEED) Trust, an international nonprofit aid organization focused on improving living and economic conditions in povertystricken areas of the world.

Their job was to find the money that fuels CEED's mission to drill hundreds of wells in Uganda, a country facing a debilitating water crisis. They ended up forging a partnership that will magnify the impact of CEED's efforts.

Annabelle, a history major from Carmichael, Calif., and Hannah, an entrepreneurship major from Merrimack, N.H., brainstormed and worked the internet and the phones, spending hours on research to create portfolio materials, make presentations, and cold call dozens of water-oriented organizations to garner support.



"I have never had to cold call so many organizations and I learned how to pitch the organization's mission to save lives in two minutes or 30 minutes," Hannah said. "Understanding the fine details of CEED in order to prove to donors why this organization was valuable to Uganda and worth the investment is tangible learning I normally could not get in the classroom."

The fruit of that labor was a call Annabelle made to Wells of Life, an organization dedicated to bringing clean, safe drinking water to millions of Ugandans. "In the moment it seemed like a last-ditch effort, but in hindsight I can see that it was a divine appointment," she said.

Instead of a receptionist or executive assistant – or even another intern – Annabelle's cold call reached Nick Jordan, the organization's founder. The match was perfect. CEED was looking for funds to build wells and Wells of Life was looking for ways to continue their mission. Annabelle connected Jordan to CEED's board of directors and a partnership was forged. A contract between the two non-profits was recently linked. Graham Hodgetts, president of CEED, said the women were relentless.

"As Annabelle and Hannah continued to make so many cold calls we could hear vestiges of desperation in their voices, but their determination prevailed. They would not take 'no' for an answer and just doggedly kept calling until they found Nick at Wells of Life. We are very impressed and grateful for them really sticking with it – and to Grove City College for producing two such winners," Hodgetts said.

"The day I learned that Wells of Life would sponsor 500 wells over five years because of that phone call which uncovered the harmonious missions of these two amazing organizations, I cried," Annabelle said. "God blessed the work we did."

Just because you help make people's dreams come true for a living doesn't necessarily mean that you have a dream job, Doug McMullen of McMullen Travel & Tours will tell you. "Even though we may make it seem easy, a lot of work goes into ensuring every detail is covered," said McMullen. "There are lots of variables that can spoil a client's travel experience, but it's up to us to make sure that doesn't happen."



Linda have been planning their clients' vacations for nearly 30 years at the company his father and mother founded in 1951 when they purchased Grove City's bus station. Bus travel, including local and charter trips was brisk business in those days, and Bob McMullen cut his teeth in the travel industry behind the wheel of a motor coach.

Throughout his remarkable career, the elder McMullen was active in travel and tourism professional societies and worked diligently to advance the status of the travel agency industry. In 1990, just three years before his death, he was recognized for his significant contributions with the American Society of Travel Agents' esteemed Rosenbluth Award, which added to his already impressive collection of professional accolades.



While a large percentage of McMullen's business is comprised of planning all-inclusive vacations the Caribbean and Mexico are especially desirable destinations—cruises and escorted tours are also very popular. And, in spite of the perceived convenience and savings associated with purchasing airline tickets on-line, the agency handles its fair share of air travel. "Many of our clients realize it's definitely more efficient, and usually more cost-effective for us to manage it for them," said McMullen. "The \$20 we charge to book their domestic flights is well worth it, when they consider the hours they'd spend at their computer doing it themselves."

In fact, rather than negatively impacting his business, the advent of Internet travel planning

sites has actually enhanced McMullen's business. Smart travelers learn that there's a lot of misinformation out there—pictures can deceive and reviews can be biased, and what starts out as a way to save money can end up as a

nightmare before you know it. "Things can go wrong very quickly," said McMullen. "And, boo-boos can be very expensive to fix."

Working with clients who have a sense of adventure is particularly enjoyable, and among McMullen's regular clients is one couple in particular who take two big trips each year to unusual and out of the norm destinations. "They're great fun to work with," he said. "They definitely have the travel bug and love visiting faraway destinations with action-packed itineraries."

Along with planning destination weddings, honeymoons and anniversary trips for clients, McMullen also arranges international escorted trips for over 300 local university and college students each year. "Most of these young people have never been out of the country, and some haven't ever flown," said McMullen. "There's nothing quite like seeing their excitement and enthusiasm—it's a great feeling to be a part of that." Sounds kind of like a dream job, doesn't it?

WAY MORE Than Just a T

Perhaps no one is more surprised at the success and notoriety of his "World Famous" t-shirt business than the former baseball card wheeler-dealer, musician and home improvement man himself, Nathan Depew. "It's kind of crazy when you think about it," said the soft-spoken president of Earth Sun Moon.

His is the familiar story of a right-brain thinker with a creative gene and maxed out credit cards, and a business born in a basement. That was 21 years ago. Today, Earth Sun Moon employs 170 and fills 300,000 orders annually, worldwide, but mostly in the United States and Canada. But, his was not an overnight success, and the journey hasn't always been a straight line for Depew. "It's been a long, expensive learning process," he said. "But, every step of the way taught me something important."

Once he decided to start a t-shirt company, the next step was to come up with an idea for a signature design. Intrigued by a volume of botanical drawings he found in an old set of German encyclopedias his mother-in-law had, he based his first venture on a series of nature prints. they weren't hot sellers, they lead to a critical discovery—niche marketing. Depew carved out a segment of the botanical prints that pictured mushrooms, and promoted them to mycology clubs across the country. Mycologists have a fondness for fungi and they loved Depew's shirts—he picked up 20 orders from club members.

He dabbled in unique packaging, including rolled up lightning bug shirts stuffed into custom made acrylic Mason jars complete with air holes in the screw-on lids, and bird shirts nestled inside—what else—bird nests. "They might sound silly, but they got us on the map,' said Depew.

In spite of challenging market forces, an economic downturn and fierce competition, Earth Sun Moon has grown steadily, with distinct "growth spurts" along the way. Depew's workforce is comprised of designers, printing press operators, embroiderers, customer service specialists who staff its call center and a full-scale management team that includes finance, marketing and product development.

Earth Sun Moon's product line has expanded far beyond the original nature prints, although a sense of the original concept runs through much of the company's offerings, with the "Advice from" series ever popular among customers. The designs feature an artistic drawing-usually an animal, bird or plantoffering a tongue-in-cheek, yet meaningful approach to selfimprovement. A large black bear wading through knee-deep water offers the following tips for better living:

- Live large
- Climb beyond
 your expectations
- When life gets hairy, grin and bear it
- Eat well
- Live with the seasons
- Take a good, long nap
- Look after your honey!

Along with outdoor activity and Star Wars themed designs, Earth Sun Moon also prints custom orders of small quantities on sweatshirts, hoodies and hats as well as t-shirts, of course.

Depew's management style reflects his personal guiding principles. "An employer's primary concern should be what's best for each person which is easier said than done—but it is worth fighting for every day," he said.

Earth Sun Moon is not a rules-based environment, and he believes that the best way to influence people's behavior is to set a strong ethical example at the top level of leadership. "T-shirts are a means to an end—the primary reason the company exists is to serve the people that work here."

Joe Jenkins came face to face with providence at just 16 years old, while straddling the ridge of a slate rooftop in Butler, Pennsylvania. The year was 1968,


and that summer, he came to several conclusions that would chart his life's course: he was not all that scared of heights, he enjoyed roofing, but he was not

about to make a living pounding asphalt shingles—certainly not after he discovered slate.

Initially, Jenkins was drawn to slate roofing for what it wasn't. "I liked that it's a natural material, and not manmade," he said. Then, he became captivated by the limitlessness of shape, texture and color varieties of slate. "Just like a painter's palette," he said. Ultimately, he thrived on the mental stimulation of fashioning these thin sheets of stone into simple, yet beautiful roofs ideally suited to shelter the dwelling they adorned for a lifetime. "It's simple stuff, but the devil's in the details," he said. "You must use your brain more when working with slate."

"TODAY, THERE'S A SHORTAGE OF SKILLED LABOR IN SLATE ROOFING,"

Jenkins' attraction to slate developed into a passion. Over the last 47 years—except for a 6-week recovery



about the World's Finest Roof in 1997. "I wrote it as a do-it-yourself guide to slate roofing," he said. Equal parts instruction manual, history lesson and photo album, Jenkins' conversational writing style makes the book an easy, yet fascinating read.

Jenkins recently retired from roofing and his sons, Brent and Orion have taken their turn at the trade. "Their skills have surpassed mine," he said. "They had a better head start than I did, working with me since they were teenagers." Spending more time with his feet firmly planted means Jenkins can focus on the business of preserving and advancing the time honored trade of slate roofing.

In 2006, he founded the Slate Roofing

A KOOFIING. a 6-week recover from a fall sustained when a church roof he was dismantling collapsed, plummeting him to the basement—he's

plummeting him to the basement—he's worked steadily, and estimates he's repaired, restored or installed about 1,500 slate roofs.

When he wasn't scaling roofs, he travelled the United States and abroad, checking out slate quarries and mines, as well as the craftsmanship of other slaters on homes, barns and churches.

Well known and respected as an expert on slate roofing, Jenkins poured his knowledge into the first of three editions of *The Slate Roof Bible, Everything You Need to Know* Contractors Association, dedicated to the preservation of traditional roofing trades and practices. "Today, there's a shortage of skilled labor in slate roofing," said Jenkins. When World War II turned slate quarry workers into soldiers, the industry stalled out just long enough for artificial, manmade roofing material to gain a foothold in the housing market. "That generation of tradesman from the last century have all died, without passing their skills onto the next generation," he said.

To help further the trade, Jenkins established the Slate Roof Training Center, where he and his sons teach classes ranging from basic installation to advanced skills, all with an emphasis on safety. Bees, bats, chimneys, wind, lightning, electrical wires and co-workers top the list of common rooftop hazards, and Jenkins teaches would-be slaters how to deal with each one. "There is a strong need for training," he said. "Guys are literally begging for it."

Jenkins' main business is a robust on-line sales resource, where slaters can purchase specialty tools and products for their trade. "You can't find these items at Home Depot," said Jenkins. "Basically, you won't find them anywhere but here."

About ten times a year, he signs on as a consultant or an expert witness for insurance companies evaluating claims for damage due to faulty slate roof installation. Most recently, he worked on a \$25 million claim by the University of Connecticut. The hardest part of this kind of work, he said, is seeing the damage incurred to buildings, many of them historic, due to the shoddy workmanship of other slaters. That, and the litigation. "I spent 12 hours in a room with 30 lawyers," he said. "I'd rather be on a rooftop any day."

If you've ever been the kid who's the last one picked for any team-or, if you've been the parent of that kid-then you know just how traumatic the experience can be. Even though Ric and Heather Blanchard never had a son playing youth football-they have four daughters who cheered-from the sidelines they saw the need for a different approach to the game. "We saw way too many kids not getting any playing time because they were too small or not aggressive enough," said Ric.






So, the Blanchards teamed up with three other like-minded couples, raised \$20,000 and formed the Grove City Midget Football Club on the foundation that every child should be given every opportunity to safely

participate in football. That was eight

years ago, and since that time, the club has grown to 100 girls and boys, including cheerleaders. These children get the chance to actively

participate, either in the game or the mandatory post-game scrimmage. As their motto says: "There are no benchwarmers here."

The Grove City Midget Football Club belongs to the Shenango Valley Midget Football League, which, unlike other leagues, keeps the youth competing against teams in their own backyard. "It's a much more local league," said Ric. "Which makes it more accessible—and affordable for parents." Lower registration fees, as well as less costly uniforms for players also help to make it more economical for families. "Even the cheerleaders' outfits are less expensive," said Heather, who coaches the cheer squad. The very competitive league has been around for over 50 years, and was where several NFL players were introduced to the sport.





levels. Last year, 30 Grove City Midgets were invited to the Pittsburgh Steelers training camp, where they had the opportunity to spend time with their idols. "Joey Porter made it a point to speak to every one of our kids, and they were on top of the world,"

said Ric.

"It was a once in a lifetime chance for our kids." Above all, said Ric, Grove City

Midget Football is built upon safety and sportsmanship. "Most kids would rather play on a losing team than sit the bench on the winning one," he said. "We emphasize that it's more important to play safe than to win a game."

Although Ric believes that every kid who participates in Grove City Midget Football is better for the experience, one in particular stands out. He was shy and quiet, definitely not a standout, his first year, said Ric. But, in his second year, emerged as a totally different kid. "He stood taller, he was confident and outspoken," he said. "The change in him was remarkable, and if he's the only kid who grows like that through this program, then we've done something really important." Chances are, he's not the only one.

One of the club's main objectives is to allow—and encourage—the smaller members of the team to play so they can build confidence, develop skills, and advance. With this in mind, the coaches and managers recognized the need for them to learn the safest game possible, so they became the first club in Mercer County to become certified as a USA Football Heads Up Football program. Through their Heads Up training,



coaches learn health and safety protocols to use on and off the field. Much of their health education centers on prevention of concussion, as well as what to look for and how to respond to concussion symptoms in their players. They also learn about other football-related health topics, such as heat stroke, dehydration and sudden cardiac arrest. Proper equipment fitting and special tackling and blocking techniques comprise the safety training.

Heads Up is endorsed by the National Collegiate Athletic Association, or NCAA, as well as the NFL for its commitment to making football a safer game at all

hen it comes to photography, if your skill set is limited to point and shoot, and your equipment is encased within your smart phone, then you would be wise to leave those once-in-a-lifetime memory shots to a professional. And, if you have any doubt that an enormous chasm exists between amateur and professional photography, experiencing the work of Shawn Sweeny will illuminate the difference for you in the time it takes to say "cheese."

For more than 20 years, Sweeny has been overwhelming his clients, wowing his peers, and at times, amazing even himself with the images he's captured through his lens. A recent Best of Show award at the Orlando, Florida School of Photographic Imaging competition rendered him nearly speechless. "All I could think was 'did they really just say my name?" he said. "It was amazing, I still can't believe it."

Sweeny's work has had him floating on a lake in a boat, high up in a cherry picker and surrounded by hay in a barn loft to get the shots that thrill his clients. One vantage point remains unchecked on his bucket list: "I'm still waiting for the opportunity to shoot while flying in a helicopter," he said.

Although he claims no particular specialty among his repertoire, which includes bridal/weddings, families, pets and product shoots, he does have a fondness for working with high school seniors. "They love to show off their personalities through their interests, what they like and who they are," he said. "And, they're great fun to work with." The props they bring along add a dimension of creative challenge also, as he's posed his teenage clients with everything from 4- to 18-wheelers to all manner of pets, including horses and reptiles.

Sweeny is committed to advancing his profession by sharing his knowledge and expertise with others who want to learn the art of photography. He was an instructor at the Art Institute of Pittsburgh for many years, and his basic camera class for local novices fills to capacity twice a year. Revered among fellow photographers for his innovative use of lighting, he frequently conducts workshops and seminars at conferences, with his lighting class always in high demand.

Composition, perspective and posing are important elements of quality photography, but lighting is the foundation upon which they are built, and Sweeny has turned the

technique into an artform all its own. His collection of special purpose light fixtures includes a rather large, very unwieldy, custom-made hexagonal contraption. "I had a vision for a type of light that would create a certain effect, but I couldn't find one anywhere," he said. "So I figured out how to build it myself."

Sweeny can make a subject look beautiful or sexy, tough or ghoulish, all by manipulating the angle and strength of the lighting. He maintains that a bad photograph is never due to an unattractive person in front of the camera lens, but an unskilled photographer behind it. "Lighting can highlight facial assets and downplay flaws, sculpting the body and face to their best advantage," he said.

One teenage client told Sweeny when she viewed her senior portraits that she couldn't believe it was her in the pictures. "She said she never thought she was pretty at all, and she was stunned to see how beautiful she really was," he said. "And, she'll be beautiful for a lifetime."

BERGERSED DECASUEES

If 'recycling' was the buzz word of the 1970s, then 'repurposing' is its modern day counterpart. From sponge-painting flea market finds to flipping old homes, this generation has embraced the concept of afterlife in a whole new way.

In the world of jewelry, it's called conversion. Conversion jewelry has been a very popular trend, according to sales staff at Joden World Resources.

Owner jeweler Joe Murawski, who spent the first half of his career 'at the bench' now oversees two world class bench jewelers who restore and recreate treasures, while he and his son, Jay focus on buying and selling to other jewelers. "Joden is known as a jeweler's jeweler," he said. "When a jeweler's wife wants something really special, they call us."

Among their top selling conversion pieces are lingerie pin necklaces. In the late 1800s, women used pairs of these small pins to secure their chemise straps to keep them discretely hidden underneath their dresses. Today, these pins, which often feature filigree work, seed pearls, enamel and colored stones are being fashioned into stylish necklaces that have mass appeal. Every time a new batch is created, they fly out of the store, say staff.

One lovely platinum and gold lingerie pin set with diamonds was fit into the top of a vintage bangle bracelet. Making use of two components that were not usable on their own is often called a 'marriage.' Each necklace is sold with a small card telling the story of its origin and how it was recreated.

Another pin that lends itself well to conversion is the stick pin. Popular as far back as 200 years ago, men wore them on lapels, ties and scarves. Later, they caught on with women, as well, but are seldom worn today. Stick pins were made in all kinds of styles and designs, animals, flowers, crescent moons and swords, and often set with gem stones, diamonds, seed

pearls or enamel. Stick pins are converted into tiny pendants, or used in groups to fashion charm bracelets, and can even be transformed into rings by soldering the charm to a narrow band.

Antique ladies watches are plentiful, but have little value, said Murawski. However, with a stroke of expert craftsmanship, they are recreated into unique and trendy pieces. "A 1920s watch made of platinum, set with high quality stones can become an exquisite bracelet that is truly one of a kind," he explained.

Brooches and pins convert easily into pendants—or combination pieces that can be worn either way—and Joden has done many of these through the years. Antique men's cufflinks are perfect for repurposing into earrings. Many are ornate, featuring hand engraving, multi-colored gold and gem stones. All that's needed is the addition of a post to the back of the piece, or they can be dangled from a French wire.

Converting outdated jewelry into new treasures is just one facet of Joden's business. From their location in the heart of Grove City, Joden caters to customers far and wide. "The funny thing is that Joden has a worldwide reputation, yet people from five miles away have never been here," said Murawski. However, once they visit, they often stay for hours. Joden lays claim to a collection of rare pieces that span hundreds of years of jewelry making, and customers are treated to a cup of coffee and an experience that rivals a visit to a jewelry museum. "It's better—we actually invite you to touch the jewelry," said Murawski.

Along with the items they intentionally make, manufacturing companies produce something else lots of residual dust and fumes. These industrial byproducts are more than just a mere nuisance; they pose a real threat to the

environment, as well as to the

people who work around them.

Jeremiah Wann, president of Imperial Systems in Mercer County, describes his industrial air filtration solution as a "giant shop vac" that is equipped to control dust and fumes in large manufacturing and assembly plants. Imperial's client list includes mega companies like Ford Motor Company, General Motors, Halliburton and Monsanto. The plant where Ford Motor's aluminum-alloy F-150 truck body is made presents a unique challenge—laser fume created when the metal is cut to shape, but it's nothing Imperial Systems can't handle.

The 41-year-old entrepreneur learned the ins and outs of the air filtration industry working as a sales representative for a company that now competes with his for business. He started Imperial Systems in 2001, working out of the spare bedroom in his home, and since then his company has grown exponentially.

Today, Imperial Systems holds six technology patents and has contracts and equipment all over the world. The majority of its 50-person workforce at the professional level staff are engineers—professional, mechanical and software, as well as purchasing agents and a CPA. The labor force is comprised of assemblers, welders and installers.

A strong movement from two federal departments over the last ten years or so has helped to carve an even deeper niche for Imperial Systems—the Department of Environmental Protection, which focuses on outdoor air quality, and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration, or OSHA, which launched a national program to protect employees from combustible dust hazards in the workplace. "Manufacturers must comply with the stringent standards set forth by DEP and OSHA," said Wann. "And, we partner with them to ensure they meet or exceed these requirements."

Industrial dust is vastly different from the household variety that dulls furniture and

windowsills. Many industries produce combustible dusts, which are ultrafine particles that can explode when they are suspended in air under certain conditions. A dust explosion can be catastrophic, destroying entire factories and causing serious injury and even death to workers.

With the heightening awareness of the hazards of combustible dusts and tighter federal regulation and control on the horizon, the demand for industrial dust and fume collection is expected to double over the next five years. "The market is huge and continually growing," said Wann, who is preparing his company to meet the increased need for air filtration systems with plans for relocation to a larger site. "This area is ideal, with easy access to airports in Pittsburgh and Cleveland, and for shipping by truck across interstates 79 and 80," he said.

Recruiting talent remains a challenging aspect of running his business, and Wann said he is always looking for qualified engineers, welders and sales professionals. "As the demand for our services grows, so does the need for highly trained and educated employees—they are the key to our success." Formerly known as "The Spot," the diner was owned by Pearl Phillips, an 83-year-old widow who told Carr she wasn't interested in selling when he first approached her about buying it.

However, running it singlehandedly 24/7 was taking a toll on her, as well as the restaurant. "It had fallen into disrepair and had a pretty bad reputation at that time," said Carr.

A friend strongly advised him not to buy it, but Carr persisted. Eventually, he convinced Phillips to sell to him when he agreed to let her stay on in the living quarters attached to the restaurant as long as she wished, which turned out to be another 13 years.

Most all-you-can-eat evenings, the place is teeming with customers—

mostly families—eating their fill of jumbo wings or hand breaded, golden fried cod.

Carr took a flyer years ago as the first non-alcoholic restaurant in the area to add wings to its menu, despite his food salesman's skepticism. "He thought it was a big mistake to try to sell wings without beer," Carr said. However, his instincts were right on target. "They exploded," he said. At its peak, The Family Tradition served over 75 tons of wings in a year's time.

It's also one of the best places to work in the borough of 900 people, and many of the employees have relatives who once worked behind the kitchen door or served customers in the dining room. Carolyn even worked there as a waitress when she was young, and, one 76-year-old server "came with the place" and continues to work a few

days a week. And, if the delicious food, charming atmosphere and congenial staff and proprietors don't beckon you to visit The Family Tradition, then maybe its epic ghost story will lure you in.

Carr has seen and done a lot of things in his lifetime and considers himself to be a guy grounded in reality. So, when he found himself face to face one night with the apparition of an elderly gray-haired woman, clothed in a dress and a shawl from another era, and standing in the corner of the stockroom, it's no surprise that he kept the incident to himself. "I knew what I'd seen, but it was hard to believe," he said. Months later, a teenaged server came running from the stockroom—she'd encountered the same woman standing where Carr had seen her, and about a year after that, a cook spotted her in the walkin cooler. The additional sightings validated that The Family Tradition did, indeed have a frequent guest who delighted in startling folks, and prompted Carr to set out to identify who she might be.


He learned from a few locals who had worked there in the 1950s that Pearl Phillips' husband died in 1956, leaving his wife the task of caring for The Spot Restaurant along with his blind mother, Thelma. They also confirmed that Thelma always wore a shawl and had died in her bedroom, which is now the stockroom. A team of paranormal investigators substantiated that Thelma's spirit is indeed a permanent, but harmless spirit resident of The Family Tradition.

Through the years, Thelma has made her presence known by sending small objects tumbling from shelves, setting the swinging doors in motion or making the tinkling sound of a spoon stirring a cup of coffee at the counter. "We've come to terms with her," said Carr.


